STEVE'S VIEW

There is a target rich environment of political issues that could be written about right now. There is the shutdown, the spectacular Obamacare startup, the continuing fiscal problems, and of course, the many scandals that have not yet been resolved. But everyone is getting tired of the Washington

follies so I will restrain myself this time around. The whole issue is complicated because Washington is so big and has way too much of our money. For now, that is not going to change.

I had my own little tangle with the state tax people recently, which illustrates the intrusiveness of government. For several years I have had to pay a small penalty for my estimated taxes even though I paid more than I owed. Never figured out what was going on until this year when I pressed the FTB for an answer. It seems that you can not pay equal installment as I have been doing. Now the law is 30%, 40%, 0% and 30%. So you have to pay tax on money before you have made it. This didn't seem right so I contacted my two state representatives about it.

I got an answer from one telling me what the law was (I already knew this) and did not comment on the poor policy of the state. But then I was surprised to see that he had listed the penalties I had paid over the last few years. He clearly had gotten access to my tax records. So I asked him where he got the authority to do that. So far no reply. I wrote to the tax advocate, but haven't heard from him either. Tomorrow I will talk to the other representative and see what he has to say. Just another hassle where the state in its wisdom doesn't try to make life easier for its citizens.

We are now visited regularly by two ravens. They eat seed spilled from our bird feeder, but prefer more substantial food like stale bread or even old dog food. We have named them

Al and Jesse after our favorite race hustlers. They will fly off, if we go outside, but wait not too far away for us to leave them something. Sometimes we will get yelled at if we go out without any offerings. The ravens have done an excellent job of acclimating themselves to an urban environment. Ravens are among the smartest birds around.

The deer, after several years 'absence have returned to the area where our cabin is located. Have

Clover loves to run after them, chasing them off a ways and then returning to the cabin quite pleased with her self. Amber used to do this for awhile but at the end just ignored them. The deer just wait until Clover returns and then they come back.

Last month five of us traveled to Kansas City to attend the Church of the Resurrection UMC Leadership Institute. Thanks to Puma grants, three other churches joined us. There were many courses to be taken and we each attended those of interest to us. For a church this large, 19,000 in four campuses, they did an excellent job of putting this on. An annual budget of two million dollars allows them to have many missions.

The thing that impressed me was their fidelity to their church mission. Everything they do seems to work toward this mission. If it doesn't advance that mission they don't do it. They also seem to have feeling that they can do what ever they put their mind to do. Obviously they have impressive physical facilities, including a coffee shop.

We also got to tour another church whose pastor visited us several months ago when he was in the area. That church was only 2,000 people in size but in its own way impressive. The pastor along with his assistant pastors took us to dinner. He will preach in our church next March.

We all came back with new ideas that could help our church grow and perform our mission better. We will be meeting in the near future to pull our thoughts together so that we can share what we have learned. For example, their digital communication systems go a long way to helping their church. I will be meeting with Esther and Mike to see what we can use to help us in this area.
